Starting off the event was a moving opening ceremony featuring a flyover, presentation of the colors by the Venice High School Junior Marines ROTC and the honoring of a 100-year-old WW II veteran (saluting). SOLID ADVICE.... A MUST READ

This story was prompted by a resident who was going outside and when she opened the door.... yep... there he (or maybe she) was just sitting there. Let's hope you never have that happen but if it does, look at this story.

You have a doctor's appointment at 8:30 am. You open the garage door and sitting in your driveway is a 7 ft. alligator. Who do you call; how long will it take them to get to your house; can you do anything yourself to scare him/her away; should you cancel your appointment; why did he choose my driveway, etc. etc. etc.?



All the above are very important points to address if this should happen. The main thing to do is:

- Stay at a safe distance and do not approach the alligator.
- Contact our Field Manager, Keith Livermore (941-485-8500), Monday thru Friday 9 am to 5 pm. If you have made contact with Keith, he will usually contact the Wildlife Authorities for you.
- Contact the Front Gate after 5 pm during the week and on weekends (941-488-7108).

- Contact local Wildlife authorities or animal control for assistance (see next paragraph).
- Avoid making loud noises or sudden movements that could startle it.
- Keep pets and children indoors until the alligator is removed.
- Do not attempt to feed or provoke the alligator in any way.
- Wait for professionals to safely relocate the alligator to its natural habitat.
- And, finally, cancel your Dr. appointment!

Who You Gonna Call?

If you are concerned about an alligator on your property or believe it poses a threat to people, pets, or property, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is here to help. The FWC administers the **Statewide Nuisance Alligator Program (SNAP)**, which is designed to address alligator-related concerns in developed areas while prioritizing public safety. To report a nuisance alligator, call the **Nuisance Alligator Hotline at 866-FWC-GATOR (866-392-4286)**. A contracted nuisance alligator trapper will be dispatched to assess and resolve the situation.

The SNAP Hotline is available 7 days a week from 8 am to 5 pm. Should your incident occur before 8 am or after 5 pm, please contact Wildlife Alert at 888-404-3922, This is the number for the FWC Law Enforcement.

If you click on https://vgrcca.org/resources/ you will find several key contacts that you might need while living in the Community. The information is especially helpful to those who are new to the community. The Community Association's website provides volumes and volumes of information for our residents and is freshened on a regular basis.

Calling 911 - Important Information Just in Case

Hopefully, you don't have to call 911, but if you do, the following paragraphs should give you valuable information about the process. Parcels reached out to Sarasota County which has the 911 Center (Venice PD and VFD use the county services) to present the following article.

At the beginning of every 911 call, the primary focus is to identify the location. This is the most critical piece of information needed to initiate a response. Call takers will ask for the **address, city, cross street**, and whether you're in a **subdivision or at a business**. Location is always asked first because



without it, we cannot dispatch help. While a full address is preferred, if the caller does not know it, landmarks, business names, parks, or other identifiable features can help narrow down the location. It's important to note that we dispatch for multiple municipalities, and some addresses or business names are repeated across jurisdictions. For example, consider Bay and Tamiami Trail—there are five intersections with that name in Sarasota County. Two of them are in the City of Sarasota (Bay Road, which becomes Bee Ridge at Tamiami Trail, and Bay Street), and each has a Publix and McDonald's at the intersection. This can make it especially challenging for visitors to provide accurate location information.

There are many factors that can affect response times, including staffing, personnel availability, distance, call priority, traffic and time of day to name a few. One misconception is that when you call 911 the operator will ask you several questions to share with the responding unit. Some people get frustrated because they think that they must answer all the questions before the unit responds. Once you place the call indicating the nature of the emergency and the location, the appropriate unit is dispatched immediately -not after all the questions posed are answered.

Finally, we have pointed out in previous editions of Parcels that if you have an emergency at your home and in the evening, please make sure to turn on your outside lights. Depending on the emergency, you might even open your garage door. If there is an emergency on the golf course or River Club or even at your home, having a "waver" out in the street waving down the emergency vehicles is very helpful and may save precious time.

Recycling Reminders:

On Wednesday mornings after the Recycle garbage truck goes by, we see plastic bags and other types of plastic flying around the streets. Plastic bags should not be placed in the recycle bins. There is a place for you to recycle those plastic bags, plastic wrapping and the foam: Publix!! Outside every Publix store there are bins to deposit all those plastic bags and egg cartons and Styrofoam. Plastic wrappings used to package water bottles, napkins, paper towels, toilet paper, etc., are NOT being collected by the City of Venice as recycling. These items may be brought instead to local retailers such as



Publix for recycling. Publix also accepts overwrap from shipping cases; Ziploc and other resealable bags (without the zipper); bread, produce and cereal bags; dry cleaning bags; newspaper sleeves; ice, salt and wood pellet bags; single-use plastic bags; clean and dry cling wrap; #4 and #5 plastics; and Styrofoam egg cartons. Clean, dry Styrofoam packing peanuts may be bagged and brought to shipping outlets such as UPS for recycling. Shredded paper is recyclable and should be placed in a paper bag with the top rolled down to prevent spillage, then placed inside the recycling cart. Free stuff from Amazon?

One of our residents, like many of you, is a regular reviewer of items he purchased. In the middle of posting a review last year, he was surprised by a popup message that asked if he would like to participate in a program called Amazon Vine, whereby merchants would ship him items for free in exchange for writing detailed reviews with photos. He said yes, of course!



There was no pressure to give 5-star reviews, but he was required to order and review at least 80 items every 6 months, and to report the retail value of the items as taxable income. A big limitation was that he could only order items offered within this program -- not anything in the vast Amazon catalog. He has written over 170 reviews and received over \$4,000 worth of merchandise over 18 months. Others might like to take part in such a program, but there is no way to "apply". You are invited based on the number, quality and helpfulness of reviews you have written, plus an element of random luck. If you like to write reviews, keep it up!
